JOAD - Junior Olympic Archery Development

Wapsi Warriors Junior Olympic Archery Development (JOAD) is a youth archery club affiliated with USA Archery that was formed in 2010 to teach young people how to shoot. JOAD is open to any youth archer aged 8 to 20 regardless of what school they attend. Both recurve and compound bows are used in club activities and in tournaments. JOAD archers who use a compound bow can train to compete in local regional and national tournaments and can earn a seat on a youth world team to compete in other countries representing the United States on behalf of USA Archery. Recurve archers can compete likewise, with the added benefit of being able to use their recurve bow to try out for a spot on the US Olympic Archery team which is selected and managed by USA Archery. The Wapsi Warriors JOAD club meets at the Waltonians Thursday nights all year long from 5 to 6:30. Any youth archers interested in joining JOAD can come out and talk to the coaches. Wapsi Warriors JOAD club members and their families typically join the Waltonian Archers and participate on a variety of levels, making them vital members of the club. INFORMATION ON TICKS AND TICK BITES

Tick season is now upon us once again. If you get one it may be a serious problem. Read this article for more info.

What does a tick bite look like?

Ticks aren't like bugs that bite you and fly away or scoot off. When one gets on your body, it sets up camp. It finds a place to eat then burrows its head into your skin and starts feeding. It will stay there for several days. Most likely you won't feel anything because the bite doesn't hurt and it isn't itchy. Because ticks are often very small, you might not see it either. At first it might look like a piece of dirt, as it feeds through, it swells up and can be easier to find. You might get a red bump where the tick bites you. Some people's bodies react to ticks with 1 to 2 inches of redness around the bite. That red area won't get any bigger unless it's a rash, which is a sign of disease.

What will the rash look like?

Only some diseases from ticks give you a rash. What it looks like depends on what kind you have.

LYME disease: Most people with Lyme disease get a rash, but not all of them. It shows up within 3 to 30 days when you get bit, but it usually takes over a week. You will see a round oval around the bite. At first, it may look like a reaction to the bite, but the rash gets bigger over days or even weeks. Typically, it reaches about 6 inches wide. It might feel warm, but usually painful or itchy. If the bite becomes more concerning, it is recommended you see a doctor.

Tick Removal

If you find a tick attached to your skin, there is no need to panic. There are several tick removal devices on the market, but a plain set of fine-tipped tweezers will remove a tick quite effectively. Use a fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible. Pull upward with steady, even pressure. Don't twist or jerk the tick as this can cause the mouth to break off and remain in the skin. If this happens, remove the mouth parts with tweezers. If you are unable to remove the mouth easily with clean tweezers, leave it alone and let the skin heal. After removing the tick, thoroughly clean the bite and your hands with rubbing alcohol, an iodine scrub or soap and water. Dispose of a live tick by submerging it in alcohol, placing it in a sealed bag, wrapping it tightly in tape or flushing it down a toilet. **NEVER CRUSH A TICK WITH YOUR FINGERS.** Avoid folklore remedies such as painting the tick with nail polish or petroleum jelly or using heat to make the tick detach from the skin.
