



Logging/Range Cleanup Update

Mark Vitosh, the DNR District Forester, visited with us at the club Thursday March 24th. About half a dozen club members were present. We walked some of the grounds and discussed recovery efforts from the Derecho. He said the logging company did a very good job with how they cleaned up the grounds, better than most he had seen.

We walked to three areas, two on the orange course and one at the top of the blue course that he felt could be made open enough to replant oaks and other hardwoods. The natural progression of the woods in this locale will be to sugar maples which provide no mast crop for wildlife and tend to shade out undergrowth causing erosion. These areas will require some small sapling removal. He will mark trees for removal at a later date. Seedlings should be 20 feet apart and protected by tubes or wire mesh enclosures. The areas are fairly small, about 3/4 acre each so we can maintain them and will have about 20 or so trees in each. He said tubes require more maintenance as they have to be lifted before winter to prevent mouse infestations. Also, he had experience with raccoons tearing them up to eat wasp larva. The trunks are also less strong so tubes have to be left on for around 8 years. The wire enclosures cost more initially but give a healthier tree with less maintenance. He has since sent us a detailed plan describing how to plant and maintain the areas. They should be planted in the spring of 2023 or 2024. Each area should be planted all at once rather than over a period of time so older trees do not shade out newer ones. Seedlings can come from the Iowa State Nursery which requires lots of 25 of all one species. Seedlings from the state nursery should be ordered by around state fair time for next spring. There is also a nursery in Tipton which sells seedlings and will allow us to select multiple species in a lot.


We walked the skidder trails, some of which are showing significant erosion. He recommended leveling out the trails that still have a hump in the middle to no more than six inches and creating erosion bars across them. We should seed them as soon as possible. He shared a particular seed mix recommended to cover logging trails. Some trails where we will do significant excavation work later may get seeded initially with annual rye just to get immediate cover and prevent erosion. He also gave us several copies of a small booklet on invasive species and how to control them.

Last we walked to the pines. In that area, once we get to it we will have to start by removing some of the tangled logs on the forest floor. Some of the broken off trees can be left standing because they make good habitat for woodpeckers and cavity nesting birds. He suggested we might want to consider leaving the area as semi open meadow because of the sandy soil.

Overall we had a good visit with encouragement and suggestions on how to proceed in our efforts to clean up and recover our woodland from the Derecho.
