Waltonian Archers Winter League Jan—Mar 2025

The Waltonian Archers will be starting Indoor Leagues for the winter of 2025 the first full week of January at our range near Toddville, Iowa. We will be offering three leagues. They will run for ten weeks after the first week which is practice and team setup. The cost is \$60 for adult members and \$70 for adult non members. Young people up to fourteen years old pay half price. Fees are due the first night of league. You can sign up on the website at www.waltonianarchers.net or show up the first night.

The Traditional League will start on Sunday January 5th at 4 PM. This league is 24 2D animal targets at various ranges up to 20 yards with two arrows per target. Equipment is longbow and recurve only without sights or releases.

The Bowhunter league will start Tuesday January 7th at 7 PM. It will shoot 24 2D animal targets at various ranges up to 30 yards with two arrows per target. Equipment can be compound bows, longbow or recurve. Sights and releases are allowed.

The Target league will start Thursday January 9th at 7 PM. It will shoot an NFAA 300 Indoor Target round. That is five arrows per end for a total of 60 arrows at the blue and white round face. Equipment can be compound bows, longbow or recurve. Sights and releases are allowed.

Open shooting will be allowed on a week by week basis subject to availability of space. League members get first preference

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

And now, the rest of the story...

I love this bow and could talk about it all day. It has taught me just about everything I know about traditional archery and being an amateur bowyer. My foray into traditional archery stemmed from the intersection of a passion for woodworking and outdoorsmanship when I saw a YouTube video of a gentleman building a fiberglass laminate recurve bow. I did a little research and bought plans for a 64" recurve bow at Bingham projects in spring of 2020. I built it exactly as the plans showed - the bow was ordered to be 55# @ 29" and came out to within 1# of spec.

This was about the only thing the bow had going for it at this point. It wasn't very pretty as it was the first trad bow I had ever held or shot. I simply did not know what a recurve bow was supposed to look like. While I could group pretty well with it, arrow flight was erratic at best because I had no idea how to tune arrows out of a traditional bow.

I harvested a doe with it that same fall at essentially point blank range from the ground without a blind on public land and proceeded to hunt the follow-



I got a lot of feedback on my bow that winter and was afforded the opportunity to shoot many other bows as well - mostly Black Widows. From this advice (shout out to Rick and Jerry) and experience shooting Widows (shout out to Joe and Mike), I learned

that I could speed up my bow by reducing the massive tips that the plans called for, in addition to reprofiling the arrow shelf for more center-shot flight and less contact area. I also reshaped the grip for comfort and reduced some bulk on the riser that wasn't doing much other than *maybe* reducing hand shock. (photos at right and bottom)

I also learned how to properly tune arrows out of a traditional bow over the course of the last hunting season and properly place string silencers. My arrow speed went from about 175fps to 185fps while also increasing my arrow weight from about 7 grains per pound of draw weight to 11 grains per pound.

Even though the bow still stacks a little bit, it shoots about as good as any store bought bow I've picked up. I'm sure that's because this is my bow and I've just become accustomed to it. Nonetheless, I've found a hobby I'll have for life and made some pretty dang good friends in the process over the last few years.
