Conservation

I just wanted to send this note out to those of you who had marked the Conservation Committee on your sign up forms or expressed interest in forestry and conservation at the archery club. We have a few projects we are working on right now.

Scott Mason and Larry Isaacs are starting work on opening up the pines ranges. Scott has mowed and opened up the road to the top of the hill except for where one tree fell about a week or so ago after he had it all done once. It is nice to be able to get up there again. Larry is having contractors bid on cleaning up about 3 - 4 acres in the lower pines which we will then replant with some type of trees. Whether to put pines back in or other species is still being discussed and studied. If you have input on that please contact Scott. At some point we will discuss and vote on it at a club meeting. We are working on an EQIP cost sharing grant program from the Department of Agriculture which we hope will cover half the cost of that clean up and planting. Mark Vitosh, the DNR District Forester is going to visit the club this Friday at 1:30 to look at the site and discuss options for fixing it up. He will also look at our 2024 planting and a couple of other things while he is here. You are welcome to join us at that time.

We are working on opening up a smaller area between #4 blue and the new Scout shooting stand. Four or five big oaks in that area have died off and the remainder is maple, ironwood and brush. We hope to plant about 25 - 50 hardwood seedlings next April in that area adjacent to the 2024 planting. Clean up is being done during weekdays on Wednesdays or Thursdays subject to weather. We are clear cutting that area like was done on the two previous plantings. If you are interested in helping with that contact me (Carl Mally) and I will put you on the list for e mail notification when we work on it.

I have been working on moving brush and planting acorns, walnuts and hickory nuts in the area between #6 and #7 white range. I have been putting the brush in the big eroded ravine next to the area hoping to slow down the erosion there. Most of that work is done for this fall but I will be working on it again next spring and summer. We had seeded some of the area last year. A few seed-lings have popped up but not as many as I hoped for. Hopefully over the next couple of years more will show. I also have started work on limiting the erosion on the 80 yard target and would like to fill some of it in next year as well as clean up behind the target butt there.

You may have seen pink ribbons on trees through the clubground and especially at the east end of the clubhouse. These are marking desirable trees, mostly oak, walnut and hickory that we want to keep brush cleared around and to encourage so they grow into mature trees. There are several areas where we have seen natural regeneration of all three species and I have been working on clearing maples and invasive species around them.

Lastly there are large amounts of invasive species that have moved into the areas since the derecho. I have been working on mowing out Canada thistle in the planting areas and pulling or mowing it in other areas. I have cut quite a bit of Tree of Heaven (Ailanthus) and applied herbicide to the stumps because it will root sprout and become worse if simply cut. Tree of Heaven hosts a particularly bad insect pest called spotted lanternfly which we have not yet seen in Iowa so it is important that it be eradicated. Similarly I have started working on removing non native honeysuckle and treating it with herbicide though there is a large amount of it particularly along the road into the club.
